MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE PICO WATER DISTRICT

A regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Pico Water District was held in the District's Boardroom located at 4843 South Church Street, Pico Rivera, California, on Wednesday, April 16, 2025 at 5:30 p.m.

The District's General Manager, Joe D. Basulto proceeded with the roll call of the attending Board members. Present from the beginning of the meeting were Director David Angelo, Director David Gonzales, Director Pete Ramirez, Vice President Victor Caballero, President Raymond Rodriguez, and Jim Ciampa, Legal Counsel for the District was present via Zoom.

President Raymond Rodriguez led everyone in the Pledge of Allegiance and General Manger, Joe Basulto, gave the invocation.

President Raymond Rodriguez proceeded to the next item on the Agenda, Public Comments. Lee Squire updated the Board on the facts of the Central Basin Municipal Water District fraud investigation case. Mr. Squire stated he offered his assistance of 37 years of operations finance and law to help Central Basin with its investigation, but his and assistance was not utilized. He also stated there was a forensic investigation, but the law firm he wanted was disqualified. He further discussed various issues relating to questionable occurrences at CBMWD and failure to follow recommended courses of action regarding financial stewardship.

President Raymond Rodriguez proceeded to the adoption of the Agenda. Director David Angelo made the motion to adopt the Agenda as presented and Director David Gonzales seconded the motion. The General Manager announced the motion passed by roll-call vote, 5-0.

President Raymond Rodriguez proceeded to the next item on the Agenda, approval of Consent Calendar, consisting of approval of the March 19, 2025 Board of Directors' meeting minutes. Vice President Victor Caballero made the motion to approved the Consent Calendar, as presented, and President Raymond Rodriguez seconded the motion. The General Manager announced the motion passed by roll-call vote, 5-0.

President Raymond Rodriguez proceeded to the next item on the Agenda, Consider Board Approval of Urban Water Management Plan Proposal. The General Manager briefly discussed the proposals received for preparation of the new Urban Water Management Plan, which, and it is to supports long-term resource planning and ensures adequate water supply are available to meet existing and future water demands. The Urban Water Plan for 2025 is due July 1, 2026. Mr. Basulto wanted to bring this to the Board to get it approved as well as getting it into the upcoming Fiscal Year budget. There were three proposals received, and he reviewed the estimated costs of the

proposals. Mr. Basulto recommended going with Stetson Engineering's proposal at \$26,000.00, which was the lowest of the three proposals received. Director David Gonzales made the motion to approve Urban Water Management Plan proposal submitted by Stetson Engineering and Director Pete Ramirez seconded the motion. The General Manager announced the motion passed by roll-call vote, 5-0.

President Raymond Rodriguez proceeded to the next item on the Agenda, General Manager's Report. The General Manager briefly reviewed the staff monthly quote and the development of staff since starting the team development training. Field staff just finished meter reading and are currently doing re-reads for residential and commercial meters. Staff is also finishing up replacing meters for meter reading route 19, with about 300 meters replaced. The prior week, management staff had a budget meeting with the accounting team, Eide Bailly, to review the upcoming budget. The current plan is to get a draft budget to the Finance Committee by mid-May for presentation to Board at the first meeting in June 2025. Mr. Basulto briefly discussed his attendance at the Water Conference of the West and the informative classes he attended. He also stated the samples from Well #11 are good and hopefully soon the well will be online in operation. There will be a committee meeting on April 28, 2025 and an agenda will be sent out tomorrow.

President Raymond Rodriguez proceeded to the next item on the Agenda, Legal Counsel Report. Legal Counsel Ciampa reported the judgment in the Proposition 218 litigation was entered on Monday, April 14, 'which triggers the 60-day appeal period.

President Raymond Rodriguez proceeded to the next item on the Agenda, Informational Items, the General Manager reviewed the Production Report for March 2025. He reviewed the state reservoir levels, which are above average. The Director of Operations briefly reviewed the Field Operations Monthly Report. Mr. Basulto briefly discussed the Ground Water Well Report.

President Raymond Rodriguez proceeded to the next item on the Agenda, Director's Request for Future Items. Director David Angelo requested a future item discussion for WRD and also have the Board approve the use of the Albert Robles Center to do a brief introduction for the Mayor of Pico Rivera to the city's Sister City from Mexico on May 24, 2025.

President Raymond Rodriguez proceeded to the next item on the Agenda, Board Member Comments. Director David Gonzales commented on an event Congresswoman Linda Sanchez will be attending on Saturday, April 19, 2025. He stated he will be attending and is already registered. Director Pete Ramirez and David Gonzales both briefly commented on the Earth Day events they attended. No further comments were made.

President Raymond Rodriguez proceeded to the next item on the Agenda, Closed Session. No closed session was held.

There being no further business to come before the Board, the Board meeting adjourned at 6:16 p.m. The next Regular Meeting will be held on May 7, 2025 at 5:30 p.m.

People in many parts of the world have the luxury of accessing clean water at any time. However, this created a false sense of security. While I enjoy the advantage given the specifics of where I live, millions are not so lucky. These people, globally, suffer from water scarcity; some walk miles to collect just a few gallons of usable water. At the same time, our misuse of natural resources has severely harmed ecosystems and endangered countless animal species. And will continue to do if people don't discern the notion of environmental issues as nothing more than a hoax or a problem not worth dwelling on. This has been happening more in the modern period, specifically since the Industrial Revolution and continues to do so today. Background:

In November 2022, the Board of Directors approved a 10% increase to the rental rate for the District-owned residential property, setting the monthly rent at \$1,870.00 as of February 2023. This property is a 3-bedroom, 2-bathroom single-family residence, approximately 1,500 square feet, and was last refurbished in 2018.

Current Market Analysis

Recent data reflects significant increases in rental market rates for comparable properties in Pico Rivera:

- **Zillow Rental Manager Market Summary**: \$3,787.50/month (average for 3-bedroom homes)
- **Rent.com**: \$3,500/month (based on current listings)
- **Realtor.com**: \$3,575/month (based on current listings)
- **Reported Market Range**: \$3,500 \$5,000/month

These sources consistently indicate that the District property remains significantly under market value — by approximately 50% or more.

Recommendation

In order to bring the rental rate closer to market value while maintaining a measured and reasonable approach, staff recommends a 10% annual rent increase over the next five years, beginning July 1, 2025.

This schedule would raise the rent as follows:

Effective Date Monthly Rent

July 1, 2025	\$2,057.00
July 1, 2026	\$2,262.70
July 1, 2027	\$2,488.97
July 1, 2028	\$2,737.87
July 1, 2029	\$3,011.66

While the rent will still remain modest compared to current market rates, this incremental approach ensures fairness to both the District and the tenant while aligning more closely with market trends.

Action Requested

Staff respectfully requests that the Board consider and approve the proposed rental increase schedule effective July 1, 2025.

Fiscal Impact:

FY 2026 Budget: \$400,000.00

Background:

Well #4A is a critical infrastructure asset within our water system, though it has historically underperformed due to persistent sanding issues. After extensive evaluation and consultation, we propose a rehabilitation project aimed at restoring this well to operational status and improving its reliability and output.

The primary issue with Well #4A is significant sand buildup, especially in the lower screened section. Our plan includes installing a liner to stabilize the well casing and mitigate further sanding. The rehabilitation work is designed to allow for water extraction from the upper portion of the well, with a target production flow of 1,000 gallons per minute (gpm). To optimize flow control, the installation of a new Variable Frequency Drive (VFD) is also included in the scope.

Once operational, the well will be placed in standby mode until PFAS (per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances) treatment facilities are available at the site.

We have secured a grant of \$355,000.00 from the California Department of Water Resources under the Urban & Multibenefit Drought Relief Program to support this project.

Next Steps:

- Finalize and submit documentation required for grant reactivation
- Coordinate with Civiltec Engineering for project management support
- Initiate the public bidding process for construction and well rehabilitation
- Complete the project by February 2026

Additionally, based on a recommendation from our project engineer at Civiltec, we plan to engage a qualified hydrologist for further testing. This step will help assess the long-term sustainability of Well #4A before making further capital investments.
